The Attakapas Chapter will host the Annual LASSAR State Meeting on April 24-25, 2015 at the [Lafayette Hilton Garden Inn](#) located at 2350 W. Congress Street. Reservations Toll Free Call 877-782-9444 or Local Call 337-291-1977.

Directions to the Hotel: The preferred method is to set your GPS before you leave home. If that is not an option try the following:

From the East: Traveling West on I-10, use Exit 101, turn left on N. University and travel under the Interstate and continue until you reach the intersection of W. Congress. Turn right on W. Congress and follow until you reach the hotel on the right, located directly across from the Cajun Dome.

From the West: Traveling East on I-10, use Exit 101, turn right on N, University and continue until you reach the intersection of W. Congress. Turn right on W. Congress and follow until you reach the hotel on the right.

From the North: Traveling South on I-49, after it passes under I-10 it become NW Evangeline Throughway; continue until you reach the intersection of E. 2nd Street. Turn right on E. 2nd Street, continue and it will become W Congress, follow until you reach the hotel on the right.

From the South: Your from here, you already know where you are, you don't need directions.

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Friday April 24th

Convention Check-In will begin in the hotel lobby at 3:00 p.m. You can check-in and pick up your conference bags, name tags, and conference credential information. If you arrive late you can check in at the reception at Girard Park or Saturday morning back at the hotel lobby.

1. **Historic St. Martinville Tour** (Christy Maraist, wife of Attakapas Chapter President David Maraist will conduct the tour). 9:00 a.m. You will gather in the Hotel lobby and carpool, caravan style to St. Martinville. Visit the Museum of the Acadian Memorial and St. Martin de Tours Church (mother church of Acadians) and other points of interest if time permits. 2. **Cajun Food Tour** (on your own) \$55.00 per person, call in advance to book reservation 337-230-6169, see their website: <http://cajunfoodtours.com/>
3. **Festival International de Louisiane** (music & food, imagine that in Louisiana). A free shuttle departs and arrives every 15 minutes at Cajun field, directly across from the hotel. The vendor's food and drinks do not except cash or credit cards. You have to purchase tickets redeemable for food and beverages, these ticket booths are available almost at every intersection. But if you buy too many and don't use them, they will not refund your money. Here is a hint for you. Remember this is free advice, so it's worth exactly what you paid for it... If going to the Festival, go in a group, not for the reason you might think. You are in downtown Lafayette. But I am concerned for your gastronomic wellbeing. If you go buy yourself you will buy food from a vendor and they ALWAYS serve portions too large. You will be full after sampling one vendor, but of course you won't stop at one. Why, because you are in Lafayette, and you have the opportunity to sample food from every restaurant in town at one location. So you buy more food, when you get back to the hotel, not only won't you want to attend the Banquet; the last thing you will want is more food. If you go in a group, one person buys a single portion and you get multiple spoons or forks and you share that portion, everyone gets a couple of bites. Then you move on to the next vendor, and someone else buys a single portion and you share. This way you don't fill up on one item, and you get to sample several dishes from the best chefs in Lafayette. Your stomach will thank you. In 2011 Rand McNally's "Best of the Road" completion rate Lafayette, best food category for a small town. In 2012 Southern Living Magazine rated Lafayette the "Tastiest Town in the South". 4. **Acadian Village** (on your own) 200 Greenleaf Drive Lafayette. Phone 337-981-2364, website: <http://www.acadianvillage.org> Open 10:00 a.m. – 4 :00 p.m. Self-Guided Tour \$8.64. The Acadian Village is a collection of buildings, gathered around a pond, that simulates an Acadian village of the 1800s. Most of the buildings are authentic, they were relocated to the Village from nearby towns. The church is a replica.
5. **Vermillionville Living History & Folk Life Park** (on your own) 300 Fisher Road, Lafayette. Phone 337-233-4077. Website: <http://www.vermilionville.org> Open 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. Self –Guided Tour (senior discount) \$8.00. Vermillionville is a living history museum and folklife park that preserves and represents the cultural resources of the Acadian, Native American, and Creole cultures – from the time period 1765 to 1890. The park sits on a 23-acre site on the banks of the Bayou Vermilion with 19 attractions,

including seven restored original homes with more than 13 local artisans that provide demonstrations on a variety of essential crafts performed by the early settlers.

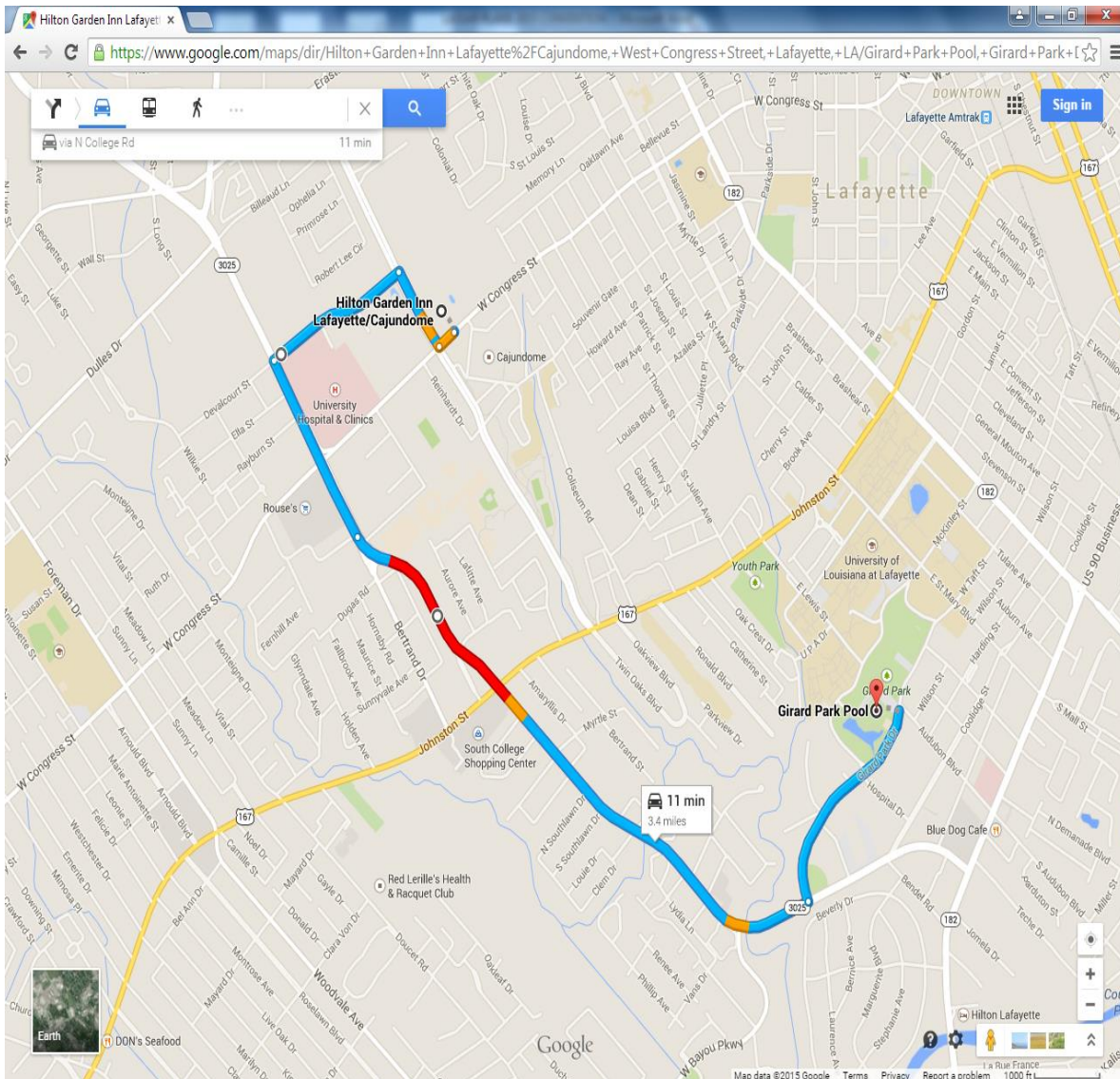
President's Banquet: (Evangeline Room) 7:00 – 9:30 p.m.

Directions to Girard Park from Hotel:

From the West side entrance of the Hotel parking lot turn right on to Cajun Dome Blvd, heading North. Continue until you reach E. Devalcourt, approx. ¼ mile, turn left on E. Devalcourt. Continue on E. Devalcourt until you reach the intersection of Bertrand Dr. approx. ½ mile. Turn left on Bertrand Dr., after you pass the intersection W. Congress you will come to a Y intersection, approx. ¼ mile, stay to the left. You are now on N. College Rd. Continue past the intersection of Johnston St. Now you are on S. College Rd continue approx. 1mile you will cross over a small cement bridge at the intersection of W Bayou Parkway, continue on S. College Rd., get into the center turning lane in order to turn left at Girard Park Drive. Continue on Girard Park Drive until you reach the park entrance, approx. ¾ mile, you will see tennis courts on your left, turn left just past the tennis courts into the park entrance. Parking lot #2 is on the right, and our Pavilion is near the far NW corner. Refer to Map of Girard Park we will be at the large pavilion marked in red with a W stamped on your map. Cox SoftWare SARApAid -- SAR Application Program

Cox SoftWare SARApAid written by Compatriot Ray Cox (TX) has been licensed by the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution as an approved NSSAR Application form software package. It is a stand-alone program, requiring no other application or software package to provide complete entry, editing, saving, recall, and printing of NSSAR Application forms.

Advantages of the Cox SoftWare SARApAid:

1. Application conversion to start new application form for applicant's son retaining all previous documentation.
2. Block operations can be used to cut, copy, or Block Paste entire generation blocks together with their respective reference fields on page 2 of the application. This is saves re-typing information when applying supplemental applications for additional patriot ancestors.
3. Allows automatic resizing in the generations References fields as you enter data by borrowing lines starting with the 12th generation.
4. Allows importing of SAR-APP PDF file for greater flexibility.

SARApAid can be ordered for \$20.00 directly from Cox SoftWare.com and includes 2 years of free upgrades via the Internet.

Love And War

The Romance of Bernardo and Marie Felicite

Following in the footsteps of his father and uncles, Bernardo de Gálvez rose to great prominence in the service of his king. He was a man born to lead others and driven to achieve tremendous success. With each succeeding position of authority, he strove to advance even further toward greatness. As a military man, this meant he would be called upon to lead others in times of war.

Bernardo started his military career at the tender age of sixteen when Spain was at war with Portugal. At nineteen, he came to the New World and fought against the Apache tribe in the northern part of New Spain, what is now Texas. At age twenty five, he survived an attack that left him with an arrow wound in his arm and a chest wound from an Apache lance. In 1772, having fought bravely in the New World, he returned to Spain. Already a hardened veteran at age twenty six, Bernardo sought to better himself as a military leader by enrolling in the Regiment of Cantabria, an admired military organization in France. While there for three years, he learned to speak French, which would be a factor later in his life. At twenty nine, he was wounded in battle, assigned to the Military School of Avila and promoted to Lieutenant Colonel. At thirty, he was sent again to the New World as Colonel of the Louisiana Regiment in a Spanish province formerly settled by the French and populated with many French speaking citizens. A few months after his arrival, he was instructed to serve as Acting Governor of the province, duties that he assumed on January 1, 1777.



Bernardo was a young, powerful and debonair figure who immediately won over his Spanish speaking citizens and with his linguistic talents, charmed the French-speaking citizenry as well. One such citizen who caught his eye was a beautiful woman from a prominent French family but born in America, the lovely Marie Felicite de St. Maxent d'Estrehan.



Marie Felicite was born into French aristocracy to one of the wealthiest families in Louisiana. Her father was Gilbert Antoine de St. Maxent and her mother was Elizabeth la Roche. At age fifteen, she married Jean Baptiste Honoré d'Estrehan and had a daughter named Adelaide. The untimely death of her husband left her a widowed mother at age seventeen. Marie Felicite has been described as a sophisticated woman possessing intelligence, charm and quite the conversationalist. Bernardo de Gálvez was smitten.

The year 1777 was indeed a banner year for Bernardo. He had become Governor of Louisiana, won over both the Spanish and French citizens and was the most beloved Governor this colony had ever seen. He also met and fell deeply in love with the woman considered at the time the most beautiful woman in all of Louisiana.

As a new Governor, Bernardo's tasks were tremendous in running a province, while at the same time, carrying on the mission of providing covert assistance to the American colonists in their bid for independence from England. He was already aware that Spain was considering joining France in allying with the American Colonists which he knew meant leading an army into battle. As a man well versed, well qualified and well respected in military tactics, he welcomed the opportunity to further prove himself in war. In addition to running the province, he spent a considerable amount of time designing preliminary plans to attack the British in the Floridas. But he could not take his mind off Marie Felicite.

As prominent figures in New Orleans, Bernardo and Marie Felicite had several opportunities to become acquainted with each other at social events. There were elegant galas, stately balls, splendid dinners and grand military functions that they attended, all of which they looked forward to as a chance to see each other again. She was enamored with him and he fell completely in love with her. Her beauty, wit, elegance and charm came to possess his heart, a heart hardened in war but now helpless in love.

After a few months of courting, Bernardo proposed to Marie Felicite and asked if she would join him on his life's journey as his wife. She accepted and they were engaged. He made a promise that he would marry and take care of her and her daughter for the rest of his life. As a man of honor, Bernardo did not make empty promises. However, sometimes fate intervenes in a young man's dreams.

While planning the wedding, Bernardo became extremely ill. The severity of his illness gave him and others doubts as to whether he would live long enough to exchange matrimonial vows. Very sick and bedridden, Bernardo wondered if he would be able to fulfill his promise to his fiancée.

As a prominent military man whose every action represented the royal crown, Bernardo was required to get permission from the king to get married. While the requisite permission was requested, it would be some time before official word was received from the royal palace. In the interim, Bernardo was near death with survival in doubt and he knew he had a promise to fulfill. Even in his grave condition, honoring his word to his betrothed was always on his mind. He was a man in love and he would defy official protocol. He would follow his heart and not the mandates of the crown. Bernardo acted as a valiant hero in an ageless love story. He would fulfill his promise to the one he loved and cheat the grim reaper before what seemed to be his imminent death. Unbeknownst to the king and to anyone but a few close friends, family and clergy, who were presumed sworn to secrecy, Bernardo married Marie Felicite in private.

With his promise fulfilled, Bernardo was at peace and ready to accept his fate. But his fate was not death, not at that time, for his health took a different turn and he started to recover. Bernardo gradually continued to improve and, eventually, he was able to resume his duties as Governor. Notice from the king finally arrived and it was good news, permission to marry was officially granted. The public wedding was performed in Havana, Cuba in a grand display of pomp and pageantry.

Bernardo and Marie Felicite's first child together, Matilde, was born in 1778 in New Orleans. When Spain declared war on England, Bernardo had to leave his wife and children, the loves of his life, for war as he embarked on his Gulf Coast Campaign.

In 1782, Bernardo and Felicite had a son, Miguel. In 1785, Bernardo succeeded his father as Viceroy of New Spain and moved with his family to Mexico City, where he and his wife became extremely popular among the citizenry. Bernardo used some of his personal fortune to begin the reconstruction of the Castle of Chapultepec and the completion of the Cathedral of Mexico. He and Marie Felicite were living idyllic lives; in love,

deeply admired with a beautiful family and another child on the way. It was in this paradise that Bernardo became gravely ill and



after a four month infirmity, he succumbed to his illness and died. Marie Felicite, her children and all the people of Mexico had lost a man they so deeply loved. Bernardo was only forty years old.

In 1786, just twelve days after Bernardo's death, Marie Felicite gave birth to their daughter, Guadalupe. At the baby's baptism, in a gesture of respect, the city government served as the child's godparents. The adoration between Bernardo and Marie Felicite outlasted all they had been through; life and death and love and war.
